On this August holy day the Church celebrates the Blessed Virgin Mary and her glorious Assumption. "When the course of her earthly life was finished," we read in the Catechism of the Catholic Church, Mary "was taken up body and soul into heavenly glory." (CCC 966) In her heavenly glory the Mother of Jesus "shines forth on earth, until the day of the Lord shall come, a sign of certain hope and comfort to the Pilgrim People of God. (Lumen Gentium #68)

Mary's Assumption is not simply a *feast*, it is a solemnity the highest rank of liturgical celebration in the Church calendar. Just as on

Sunday, there will be three readings at Mass, the Gloria will be sung or said and the congregation will recite the Creed.

Other August Feasts

August 6: Transfiguration Jesus led Peter, James and John up a high mountain and "was "transfigured before them." HIs face "shone like the sun and his clothes became white as light.' Moses and Elijah appear to them and the apostles hear a voice from a bright cloud that said, "This is my beloved Son, with whom I am well pleased; listen to him."

August 10: Saint Lawrence One of the 7 deacons of Rome martyred in 258 under the Emperor Valerian. When the emperor demanded that Lawrence hand over "the Church's treasures" the deacon presented the destitute, the orphans, the blind and the lame. For this, according to an ancient story, Lawrence was roasted on a gridiron.

August 24: Saint Bartholomew One of the 12, traditionally identified with Nathanael. In John's Gospel Jesus refers to him as "a true Israelite. There is no guile in him."

Donna's Creation Care Corner

Foxglove Beardtongue -A Pollinator With An Intriguing Name

Foxglove Beardtongue (*Penstemon digitalis*), a perennial native to Eastern North America, is wonderful for pollinating insects.

It can grow up to three feet tall with each stem producing up to 75 flowers. Its profusion of tubular, bright-white flowers on strong stems are magnets in May and June for many types of beneficial insects. This pollinator keeps gardens in bloom for a long time. It is one of the first to attract bees after the flowers of



the trees have bloomed. Furthermore, it covers a "blooming gap" between the end of spring flowers and the start of summer flowers. Mike and I saw no bees in our garden this year until the foxglove had bloomed!

And its intriguing name? According to folklore, foxes used the plant's blooms to keep dew off their paws. Another story claims that foxes wore the blooms in order to walk without making a sound allowing foxes to sneak up on prey with ease. Others say 'foxgloves' comes from 'folks'

gloves' as in fairy folk, and the idea of fairies wearing or living in these flowers is widespread in some countries. According to others, the spots inside the flowers are marks left by fairies that have touched them, and witches use foxgloves to help them fly. It's also thought that foxglove juice will keep fairies from trying to steal children; there is even a tradition in Scotland where foxglove leaves are put into a newborn's cradle to protect the baby from being bewitched!

What about beardtongue? The name comes from the physical appearance of the flowers. Each has five stamen, four fertile and the fifth sterile. The tiny hairs on that fifth stamen give it a tongue-like appearance, thus "Beard Tongue."

Plants from the foxglove family are critical in both medicine and science. The ancient Romans used foxgloves as a heart tonic. The modern drug digitalin, which is used to treat heart conditions, is derived from foxgloves. Other chemicals found in the plant can detect DNA in lab samples. These uses underscore the importance of keeping all native plants healthy and thriving for their beauty, the nectar they provide for birds and insects, and their yet-to-be-discovered medicinal uses.

Pope Francis, in his monumental encyclical *Laudato Si* states that it is our "moral imperative" to assess "the impact of our *every* action and *personal* decision on the world around us." These actions and decisions include the space surrounding our own homes. We cannot wring our hands over climate change and the destruction of the Amazon rainforest, if, at the same time, we fail to recognize the deleterious effects on pollinators, their food sources and habitats caused by chemical fertilizers, insecticides and pesticides used on our yards and lawns. Preserve the beauty of God's creation and plant native flowers for pollinating insects!

Update for GIFT (Growing In Faith Together) and for GIFT Sacramental Programs

Classes for our GIFT and GIFT Sacramental programs will begin in October, but mailings for both programs will go out this month. Overview meetings for the Sacramental Programs will be held in in a Saint Ann Parish Center classroom next month according to the schedule below.

First Reconciliation and First Communion

Parents/guardians of children in our First Reconciliation/First Communion program are required to attend one of these meetings:

Tuesday, September 12, 6:30 - 7:30 p.m.

Friday, September 15, 6:30 - 7:30 p.m.

Children are not required attend, but a catechist will be available to supervise a separate children's activity if childcare is needed.

Confirmation

Parents/guardians *and* first year candidates in our Confirmation program are required to attend one of these meetings: Tuesday, September 19, 7:00 - 8:30 p.m. *or* Monday, September 25, 7:00 - 8:30 p.m.

During monthly GIFT sessions in 2023/2024 participants will learn about and discuss the seven sacraments: Baptism, Confirmation, Eucharist, Penance/ Reconciliation, Anointing of the Sick, Matrimony and Holy Orders. Monthly GIFT gatherings always include a breakout session for adults of all ages. If you would like to learn more about these beautiful sources of God's grace at an adult level of understanding, please plan to be with us.

GIFT Program representatives will also be available after all Masses the weekend of September 16/17 to answer any questions you might have about our faith formation/religious education programs. Should you need additional information please reach out to Maria, as above.



Adult Faith Formation

RCIA Are you, or is someone you know, interested in becoming Catholic? Or are you an adult Catholic who has never received the Sacraments of Holy

Communion (Eucharist) and Confirmation? If this is the right time for you to take the next step on your journey of faith or if you have questions about that step, you might want to consider our parish RCIA program, which begins in September.

RCIA (the Rite of Christian Initiation of Adults) is the process through which people join the Catholic Church or complete their initiation into the Catholic Church. The RCIA is designed for:

* People who have not been baptized

*People who were baptized into another Christian denomination and wish to enter into full communion with the Catholic Church

*Baptized Catholics who were never formed in the Catholic faith and have not completed their initiation (who have not received the sacraments of Eucharist and Confirmation)

We will also offer an adapted version of the RCIA program for teens or children (above the age of reason) who have not been baptized and want to receive the Sacraments of Baptism, Confirmation and Eucharist If you have questions or would like further information, please contact Maria (as above).


