# October 23, 2023, 7:00 PM St. Ann's Church

# Father John's Comments:

Fr. provided the September financial report prepared by the financial committee. The parish has recently changed to a fiscal year reporting from a calendar year.

Fr. provided a report on the average percentage capacity of the masses. The average capacity of all the masses in September 2023 was approximately 34%. The Archdiocese guidance explains the desired percentage capacity be no less than 50% or questions must be asked about the mass schedule.

Father asked for volunteers to form a small group to study and brainstorm a new strategy to address this issue. Volunteers to review options about when and how to reduce the number of masses from 4 to 3 are: Rose Marie M.; Frank L.; Terri D., Deacon George.; John K.

Fr. shared how the Archdiocese is to consider a new policy for voluntary retirement of priests at 71. Right now, mandatory retirement is 75. The purpose of the new policy will be to create a pool of retired priests who can serve on demand. There are certain financial incentives for the priests to consider this option. Other major cities in CT have had consolidations. For example, New Haven has 8 churches in one Parish.

Father met Archbishop Coyne who will replace Archbishop Blair in April 2024.

#### Human Concerns Committee

Meeting Notes from October 16, 2023 Attendance: Manfred J., Elizabeth S. Wally H., Rose Marie M., John M., Marie T., Al M.

Domestic Violence Initiative:

We were honored by the attendance of Rachel Schippani, Coordinator of Community Education and Volunteer Programs for BHcare.

BHcare Umbrella Center for Domestic Violence Services (UCDVS) provides services for victims and their children at two sites located in Shelton and New Haven. All services offered are free of charge and confidential. Services support 170 different languages 24 hours a day, 7 days a week.

This was the second meeting with BHcare. In September we were blessed to have Melissa Simoni, Development Coordinator, Umbrella Center for Domestic Violence Services.

We had a valuable discussion with Melissa, and we challenged her with questions. She shared the questions with Rachel who wrote the following answers:

- Do we have any relationships with churches if clients would like someone spiritual to talk to or be around? For example, say a client would like to start attending church, speak to a Priest and /or head of church?
  - Our counselors help clients make connections to churches (if that is something they are looking for) depending on the area that person is from. We do not have specific connections, but work to find a connection based on the town or city our client is living in.
- Are there any patterns you see when clients come in...around holidays, economy bad, school starts, unemployed etc.
  - There are not typically any specific times we see an increase in clients. Unfortunately, there
    has been an increase in our number of clients over the past few years. We always say dv does
    not discriminate based on day, time, socioeconomic class, race, gender, religion, age
    etc. Mondays are typically very busy for us because we have all the clients from incidents that
    occurred over the weekend.
- Do you have any success rate or measurements on clients getting out of dv relationships?
  - On average it takes about 7x for an individual to leave their abusive partner for good. There are many factors that contribute to being able to leave including finances, children, a support system, pets, housing etc.

We had a valuable discussion with Rachel around these questions and answers and decided to:

- Share information to educate the community about the availability of BHcare services and invite them to reach out.
- Write a short description of BHcare services with Rachel's contact information and request it appear in the weekly bulletin.
- Display a poster about the services in each church.
- Explore the possibility of having BHcare make a presentation to our youth about building and maintaining healthy relationships.

It was decided to place a promotion for BHcare services into our bulletin as follows:

## Domestic Violence Services

The Mission of The Umbrella Center for Domestic Violence provides practical assistance and support for victims of Domestic Violence and seeks to create an environment that supports individual safety and breaks the cycle of violence. If you know someone who has been a victim let them know they are not alone. The Umbrella Center can help them break the cycle of abuse by offering free services of: shelter, counseling, support groups and other services.

**Our annual Advent Luncheon** will be held on November 19<sup>th</sup> at 12 noon in St. Gabriel Hall. The purpose is to bring our parish family together and have a charitable event. We collect new unwrapped winter items such as hats, gloves, scarves, and socks which will be donated to various organizations including Beth El Shelter.

We also require everyone to bring a nonperishable item for our food pantry. Our pantry feeds many individuals every week.

We will also have a collection basket to donate money for the food pantry so Donna, the Director, can purchase items as needed. Michele and Mary organize all the donations.

The menu will have 3 soups, tuna ham and cheese sandwiches, condiments, chips, dessert, coffee, tea and juice.

I am happy to report that for 20 + years we have helped our community with proceeds from this project/event. I am grateful to all who attend, contribute, and who enjoy each other's company. I am also grateful to Fr. John for his participation and his prayers.

## Faith Formation – Maria Tomasetti

- Our November GIFT (Growing in Faith Together) program dates are Sunday, Nov 12 and Tuesday, Nov 14. Topic: Sacraments: The Eucharist. We will have approximately 66 families participating in our GIFT program, including our Sacramental programs. Our family faith formation model includes adults, in addition to children and teens.
- Approximately 20 children are preparing to receive First Reconciliation and First Communion. Approximately 21 teens are preparing to receive Confirmation in Fall 2024. 14 teens will be receiving the Sacrament of Confirmation at the Cathedral of Saint Joseph in Hartford on Sunday, October 29.
- Three adults will be receiving the Sacrament of Confirmation at the Cathedral of Saint Joseph the evening of Tuesday, November 7.
- We have four adults and one teen participating in our "RCIA" program, now called OCIA (Order of Christian Initiation of Adults) due to a recent name change by the U.S. Conference of Catholic Bishops. Three are catechumens, preparing to receive the Sacraments of Baptism, Confirmation and Eucharist. Two are candidates, one Catholic and one Lutheran, preparing to receive the Sacraments of Confirmation and Eucharist.

Our Teens for Service group will be packing Christmas Boxes of Joy on Monday, Nov 6, a project through Cross Catholic Outreach. The boxes will be received by children in poor and developing

countries, including Dominican Republic, El Salvador, Grenada, Guatemala, Honduras, Haiti, and Malawi. Later in November, teens will be packing Thanksgiving food bags for parish families in need.

• Our 14th annual summer "VBS" camp is scheduled for July 22 to July 26, 2024, designed for children ages 4 through 11. The theme will be SCUBA: diving into friendship with God. Volunteers are always needed, adults and teens age 12 and older. There is a role for everyone, including set-up and decorations on several weekday evenings during the two weeks prior to the camp.

#### **Open Forum:**

<u>www.catholic.com</u> is a recommended website for answers to questions that many Catholics may ask. This is known as an apologetics website (offering reasons why we are catholic and why we believe what we believe).

The council recommended we request 1,000 copies of the free booklet entitled "Why We're Pro Life" for distribution to parishioners. Individuals can make donations to cover the cost of the booklet. The booklet clarifies the reasons why protecting life and being pro-life is justified by both science and logic.

The council expressed sincere and enthusiastic appreciation to Peter DeMarco and the St. Ann Choir for organizing and performing in the concert with Ivan Diaz.
